I got a taste of the potential rigor of college classes. Besides the practical skills I came away with of learning how to cite sources and not taking the easy way out just looking online, I was also blessed to have a semester less of credits to take and a solid foundation in my faith.

One specific situation I recently shared my gratitude for with my friends was in senior year English. We were assigned to come up with answers to a hypothetical

reach out to all alumni and benefactors who, both local and far away, have been <u>"formed," under the Mantle</u> <u>of Our Lady</u>. We use the word "formed" because it is much more broad than "educated." "Formed" includes education, but also involves the way we live and treat each other, and grow individually and together in a relationship with God through His Church with the aid of the Sacraments and through prayer.

I am grateful for the great support that we receive from our alumni and benefactors, both locally and from a distance. For the past nine years, we have held our annual fundraiser called Caribbean Knight Party. In recent years, it has raised \$200,000+/year with the purpose to increase enrollment and maintain affordable tuition. Without this event, tuition would increase 15% instead of 5%. It also provides funds for transportation to attend our school from neighboring towns. A live auction at the Caribbean Knight Party each year includes many clever and valuable things to auction off. Since Fr. Tanner Thooft has been here, he has offered a "day of farm work" to be auctioned off, and it has proven to be a very lucrative offer. In 2023, when he first offered it, it went for \$3,750 to four individuals bringing in \$15,000. This year, he offered the same and it sold for \$4,200 to four individuals bringing in \$16,800! As good as Fr. Tanner's work ethic is, this shows the generosity of the people who contribute to the success of St. Mary's Catholic School!

conversation we would have with a fallen-away Catholic, Protestant, atheist, and "spiritual but not religious individual." That assignment alone helped me to think about how I would defend the truth, truly reflect on why I don't believe those viewpoints, and to become more aware of the world outside my Catholic bubble. In religion class, we also had a debate on the lie of relativism that solidified the irrationality and pain that many unfortunately bear living this way. These are very present realities on a college campus.

Most importantly it was through St. Mary's that first learned to truly pray and talk to God my Father. I learned to be honest and that the most freeing and beautiful way to live is to ask Him about it. I started to learn His voice of peace and clarity even if all of this made me seem different and stand out to my peers. Weekly Mass was where I fell in love with the Mass first and craved to continue going daily in my college schedule. The Sisters that taught me gave me a fresh perspective on the beauty of religious life. That experience in itself has had a lasting effect on my discernment for the future after college. I sincerely believe I was blessed with a firm Catholic foundation that freed me to grow and struggle with Christ as my anchor and guide through St. Mary's. Thank you to all that made this possible."

St. Mary's Catholic High School presented Legally Blonde The Musical on November 17-18, 2023. Legally Blonde is a 2007 musical with music and lyrics by Laurence O'Keefe and Nell Benjamin and a book by Heather Hach. It is based on the novel Legally Blonde by Amanda Brown and the 2001 film of the same name.

DEAN BRINKMAN REMEMBERED WITH AWARD

Dean Brinkman graduated from St. Mary's High School in 1981, and sadly he passed away on September 5, 2022. Shortly thereafter, his brother **Dan ('71)** formed a committee to nominate his brother and one year later, on September 16, 2023, Dean was inducted into the Minnesota Amateur Baseball Hall of Fame.

Dean Brinkman approached the game of baseball like life with the passion and exuberance of a kid. Beginning with backyard sports with friends to VFW, Legion and high school baseball at Sleepy Eye St. Mary's, Dean was a leader on and off the field and was an essential part in those teams qualifying for multiple state tournaments. Following high school, Dean played one season at Boone Community College in Iowa where he hit an impressive .404 and helped the Bears qualify for the Junior College World Series in 1982. In 1983, Dean transferred to St. Cloud State University and played infield for two seasons before pursuing his Doctor of Chiropractic degree.

In 1981, Dean began his 20-plus year amateur baseball career where he was known as a power hitting pitcher/shortstop with a lifetime batting average above .300 and over 150 home runs. He played in eight state amateur tournaments for the Sleepy Eye Indians and multiple years as a draftee, being selected to the All-Tournament team in 1986 and 1995. A highlight of his amateur career was at age 19, when Dean hit a grand slam, a three-run home run, a double and a single, knocking in a whopping 10 runs. He continued to play competitive baseball until his mid-50s. When not playing the game, Dean helped young softball and baseball players develop skills through coaching, supervising open gym and throwing hours of batting practice. He was a driving force behind several ballpark fundraising endeavors, including implementing sponsored signage boards at the ballpark. He also helped coordinate the 100-year anniversary celebration of Babe Ruth's barnstorming game played at Sleepy Eye Ballpark in 1922.

For over 30 years, **Dr. Dean** provided care, healing, and friendship to his patients at Sleepy Eye Chiropractic. He was a member of the Lion's Club, President of the Sleepy Eye Medical Center Foundation, and President of the Sleepy Eye Baseball Boosters.

Dean had four priorities in life--faith, family, caring for others and baseball. He truly personified the philosophy of, "We don't stop playing when we grow old; we grow old when we stop playing."

Dean was born to **Dr. Don** and **Donna Brinkman** in 1963 and married **Sandy (Polesky) Brinkman** in 1991. They have three children: **Alex ('12), Deonna ('14)**, and **Carter**.

Dean crossed home plate to heaven in September 2022.


